History



The Kiowa Fire Protection District covers a 324 square mile area of north central Elbert County and is comprised of approximately 95% undeveloped land, 4% residential properties, and 1% commercial properties. The district runs to the county line at County Road 194 on the North. The Eastern boundary is bordered by County Road 125, the Southern boundary is County Road 94 and the Western boundary is County Road 25.

The Kiowa Fire Protection District has a population of approximately 2,500 permanent residents with about two thirds of the population commuting out of the county for work. The district is mainly comprised of rural agricultural lands with low density mixed value housing on lots ranging from three acres up to 35 acres. While the fire district is primarily rural, it also encompasses a small downtown area of about a half of a square mile which includes single and multi-story commercial structures, small residential structures, a mobile home park, the Elbert County Justice Center, the Elbert County Administrative Building and the Elbert County Fairgrounds. It is anticipated that Elbert County will experience an annual growth rate of 3.63% or an overall growth rate of 191.1% from 2000-2030. This is expected to exceed the growth rate of neighboring Douglas County

The Fire District is covered by two fire stations. Station 221 is located at 403 County Road 45 in downtown Kiowa and Station 222 is located off of County Road 53 Road 53 approximately 1.5 miles North of County Road 166. Additionally the Fire District maintains an Auxiliary structure called the Annex adjacent to Hwy 86 immediately North East of Station 221, currently being transformed into a Training Facility.




Budget Message

In addition to regular fire suppression, EMS, and Fire Code enforcement services, additional activities included ongoing yearly upkeep of firefighting equipment, communications and medical equipment and continuing education programs for paid and volunteer staff. The Kiowa Fire Protection District has a full time Fire Chief and Deputy Chief, a full-time EMT/ Lieutenant, 5 part-time paramedics, and a part-time Administrative/Finance Officer. The District is also served by approximately 25 dedicated volunteer firefighters and EMT's and continues to recruit additional volunteers to satisfy the needs of the District. The volunteers have an integrated shift work schedule to help provide a faster response to the community. In addition to paid and volunteer staff, the District has automatic and mutual aid agreements in place with surrounding agencies. All of these systems are the backbone of public safety services provided to the residents of the District.

The Kiowa Fire Protection District saw an increase in assessed valuation from 2019 to 2020 by \$7,226,131 which equates to \$62,788 in property tax revenue. The Kiowa Fire Protection District's mill levy remains at 8.689 mills where it has remained since the District was formed in 1983. For a number of reasons, the cost to provide nationally recognized public safety services has increased faster than taxes our community pays.

Revenue is an issue the District will have to continue addressing with strategic planning and management practices to enhance our efficiency and help our District meet today's priorities and tomorrow's challenges. Grants



Grants are a great way for our department to acquire additional funding for equipment and services that exceed our department's operational budget. Grants can help pay for safety equipment, new fire apparatus, EMS equipment or provide funding for additional staff. Securing proper funding allows us to provide a safe work environment for our firefighters and helps ensure public health and safety.

Accomplishing these goals at a time when it is imperative to capitalize on every expenditure and opportunity is challenging. What most people don't understand is the time and energy that is required to search and successfully write the grants, then in turn complete the process if the grant is awarded. Kiowa Fire is extremely proud of our grant seeking efforts and those that are awarded.

2020 GRANT AWARDS

- An \$1154.00 grant from FM Global Insurance to purchase new desktop computers for Station #1.
- A grant through Firehouse Subs Corporation in the amount of \$24,384.65 to purchase a new cascade air compressor system to fill firefighting self contained breathing bottles.
- \$4696.82 grant from the Volunteer Firefighters Assistance Grant. This was used to purchase fire hose to replace outdated hose.
- A \$2000.00 grant from the Wal-Mart Foundation to purchase structural Personal Protection Gear in the form of firefighting gloves and protective hoods.
- A \$5000.00 grant from the El Pomar Foundation to purchase wildland personal protective gear in the form of shirts, pants and leather gloves.
- A \$4,992.00 grant from Mountain View Electric to purchase 2 sets of structural firefighting personal protective gear in the form of coats, pants, and suspenders.
- A \$7985.75 grant from the Firefighter Safety and Disease Prevention Grant. This allowed us to purchase an extractor to wash and remove carcinogens from bunker and wildland gear.
- A \$17,563.43 grant through the Corona Virus Relief Fund which assisted in purchasing an abundance of Personal Protective Equipment, 4 ruggedized laptops, an ultraviolet sanitizer for equipment and 3 air purifiers for Station #1.



Operations

Our departments 2020 Operating budget was \$826,701. Revenue budgeted for ambulance user fees was \$65,000. Our apparatus include 2 Advanced Life Support equipped ambulances, 3 structural engines, 3 brush trucks, 1 water tender, 2 support vehicles, 2 command vehicles, 2 snow mobiles, and a Snowcat.

Highlights include:

- Lt. Garza completed his State Fire Officer I certification. All full time fire personnel now have Fire Officer State Certification.
- COVID Pandemic resulted in a change in community interactions and an increased awareness in personal protection equipment for our responders. One third of our department contracted COVID which resulted in a temporary staffing shortage.
- All garage door openers at Station #1 were replaced at a cost of \$5160.00.
- All department radios were replaced from Tait to Kenwood through assistance from the Elbert County Communications Authority.
- Annual hydrant testing was performed.
- All 73 businesses within the Fire District had annual fire inspections performed.
- All department fire hose underwent annual testing.
- The Volunteer Firefighters have developed a "Mechanics Division" which assists the parttime mechanic in maintaining the District's vehicles.
- The District held a Firefighter 1 Academy. This 16 week academy prepared four recruits to take their State Firefighter I and Hazardous Materials exams. Upon successful completion, 24 of our 25 volunteers will have their Firefighter I or higher.
- The District formed a Wildland Deployment Team. The team, made up of Type 1 and Type 2 Firefighters, EMT's, Paramedics, Sawyers, and Engine Bosses spent 59 days on the Grizzly Creek and Cameron Peak fires, providing fire suppression, mitigation work, and medical standby. The efforts made by these firefighters provided an additional \$53,224.00 in revenue to the District.
- The District purchased a new 2020 Ford Expedition Command Vehicle for the Deputy Chief. This replaces a 2007 Ford Expedition that had nearly 200k miles.
- The Administrative Office received a much needed makeover at a cost of less than \$200.00. All work was performed by District employees.
- The volunteer firefighters volunteered 19,850 hours of shift work in 2020. This equates to 54.3 hours a day and a minimal dollar value of \$297,750.00 to the residents of our District.



Responses

In 2020 The Kiowa Fire District ran 406 calls for service, down one call from 2019's call volume of 407 calls. The average response time was 8.58 minutes. For a rural agency that is 97% volunteer, the 8.58 average response time is something we are extremely proud of.

Training

Our firefighters performed 2,400 man-hours of training in 2020. Trainings include both fire and medical aspects, which include search drills, hose management, vehicle fires, foam evolutions, wildland response, water supply, fire streams, live fire evolutions, hazmat, rope rescue, Basic Life Support, and Advanced Life Support skills. At this time 90% of our staff hold a Firefighter I, Hazardous Operations, EMT, or greater certification.

- Members attended two live-fire trainings at Aurora and Sable Altura.
- A Firefighter 1 Fire Academy was held, with 4 members obtaining their State Firefighter I certifications. This brings the total of 24/25 of our active volunteers having their Firefighter I or higher.
- 4 members successfully completed their EMT Basic course at Rattlesnake Fire. This brings a record total of 21 EMS providers to the agency.





Community Events

2020 brought an influx of challenges to the Community amidst the COVID-19 pandemic. With safety concerns we were forced to cancel many of our annual community events. This didn't stop the firefighters from working with our community. In 2020 our firefighters...

- Participated in multiple Birthday drive-by parades.
- Performed EMS standby at the Kiowa High School football games.
- Participated in a the Town of Kiowa's Fair parade.
- Conducted two fire alarm drills at the Kiowa Schools.
- Made multiple appearances to the Kiowa Elementary School to talk about fire safety with the students.
- Participated in the Town's Parade of Lights.
- In December we held a "Santa Ride-Along" to hand out treats to the children.





Training Center

In January 2020, the Kiowa Fire Protection District Volunteer Firefighter's Association received approximately \$8500.00 from a memorial fund on behalf of Colton Mason, one of our firefighters who passed away January 4, 2020. His family had requested that the volunteer firefighters earmark the fund for training.

It was determined that we would expand our already existing training facility located at 731 Comanche St, which is at the east end of the Town of Kiowa. This training prop will be the only one of its kind in the County and will be used by all County Fire agencies. Currently agencies must go to Aurora or Parker to use similar facilities. The facility will also be available to local law enforcement agencies for training purposes.

The training ground will consist of 4 Conx boxes ranging from 10' to 40' in length and 9' in height. They will be arranged in such a manner as to depict a one-story residence with a walkout basement. The structure will be certified by the state for training compliance.

Windows and doors will be cut from the existing walls. The entire structure will be professionally painted grey in color. In addition, there will be a separate 20' conx box, also painted grey, which will act a storage container for all of the Fire Districts smaller training props and training gear.

Current training props are a designated forcible entry site, a wild land fire training area and a designated auto extrication pad. Future fire training props will be a 500 gallon propane tank and a vehicle fire site.

An all-weather surface of recycled asphalt will be placed on the west end of the burn prop for fire vehicle access.

In addition to the Memorial fund many community members rallied behind the project and have donated labor, supplies and expertise

Development of the project started in May 2020 and total completion is expected by the Spring of 2021.







2020 Wildland Season

The 2020 Wildfire season exploded in Colorado igniting three of the largest wildfires in Colorado history (Cameron Peak, East Troublesome, and Pine Gulch). This same year was the pilot season for the Kiowa Fire District Wildland Deployment Program. This team is made up of firefighter's specially trained to operate on large wildfires.

The Deployment team is made up of 8 members including Type 1 Firefighters, Type 2 Firefighters, EMTs, Paramedics, Sawyers (specialized chain saw operators), Firing Bosses, Engine Bosses, a deployable Ambulance, and a deployable Type 6 Brush Truck. The Wildland Team spent a total of 59 days on the Cameron Peak Fire with crews rotating out every two weeks. In the 59 days, the team members fulfilled a variety of roles including, fire suppression, mitigation work, structure protection, emergency medical response and medical standby. While they provided much needed aid in a variety of roles on these wildfires, they also proved to be a valuable revenue source for the District bringing in just over \$53,224 of unanticipated revenue.

The District intends to expand on the program in the years to come.
